More recently, Xiqing Chen emphasized that it represents a new concept—re-examining and transforming the constituent elements of united front work through internet thinking, constituting an innovation in its fundamental approach^[3].

In essence, online united front work refers to the use of information technology to target key figures in new media, employing a "big network, big united front" mindset to consolidate and develop the united front. It signifies innovation in methods, exploration of new domains, and a transformation in underlying philosophy, synthesizing technology, systems, and concepts^[4].

Furthermore, this work facilitates in-depth exchanges between these students and their mainland peers, breaking geographical barriers, enhancing mutual understanding and friendship, and jointly building a foundation for the Chinese nation's community of shared future. This cross-regional, cross-cultural connection helps cultivate correct national and ethnic perspectives and lays a solid foundation for these students to become future bridges between the mainland and Hong Kong/Macao, holding significant value for promoting integrated development and safeguarding national unity.

2.2.2 Positive Significance for Uniting Non-Party Intellectuals in Colleges and Universities

3.2.2 Lack of Innovation

However, universities often lack the necessary innovative mindset and capacity. This deficiency may manifest as inadequate proficiency in using new media tools, delayed analysis and response to online public sentiment, and insufficient sensitivity to emerging trends and demands in the online space, leading to outdated and ineffective approaches.

3.2.3 Inadequate Work Mechanisms

Inadequate coordination and information-sharing mechanisms pose significant challenges. Effective online united front work requires robust systems to ensure systematic implementation. Current practices often suffer from departmental silos, poor information flow, and a lack of integrated resource utilization. When confronting complex online public sentiment, the absence of effective response mechanisms and strategies can result in passive and inefficient efforts. Additionally, coordinating the schedules and securing funding for non-Party faculty involved in united front activities remains difficult, hindering the building of a robust workforce^[7].

4. Innovating Pathways and Methods for United Front Work

"The effectiveness of united front work is directly linked to the professional competence and leadership capabilities of its cadre"^[8]. To improve effectiveness, universities can adopt three strategies. First, establish a networked joint

conference platform mechanism for information sharing, guided by the needs and evaluations of united front targets. This strengthens connections among members, boosting their confidence and encouraging active participation. Second, continuously explore cutting-edge information technologies like cloud computing for data processing, mobile applications for accessibility, and AI algorithms for personalized information recommendations. Developing interactive online forums and social media is also crucial. Third, strengthen content innovation and cultural development by producing high-quality content aligned with young students' tastes, such as engaging online courses and cultural festivals, to enhance cultural confidence and value recognition.

4.2 Optimizing University United Front Work Systems

Ensuring efficient operation requires establishing a refined cross-departmental collaborative system with clear responsibilities and feedback mechanisms. First, improve the multi-departmental coordination mechanism under the leadership of the Party committee to achieve political guidance. In the "everyone has a microphone" era, this mechanism ensures diverse voices disseminate positive energy and tell China's story effectively, while guiding public opinion and constructing a comprehensive work system. Second, prioritize cultivating student online opinion leaders through specialized training programs in digital communication and online persona building. Providing practical opportunities, like participating in online discussions and organizing digital events, enhances their hands-on experience and leadership capabilities.

4.3 Enhancing Information Technology Application

A high-caliber, professional workforce is essential. Four strategies are key. First, strengthen the IT capabilities of personnel through targeted training in big data collection, processing, analysis, and application, using lectures and case studies. Second, establish multidisciplinary teams by leveraging disciplinary strengths to include faculty and students from diverse backgrounds, fostering cross-disciplinary collaboration and innovation. Third, strengthen political literacy and ideological awareness through regular political theory study and current affairs education, alongside professional ethics cultivation. Finally, establish a robust incentive mechanism and support system with scientific assessment and rewards, ensuring personnel have the necessary conditions and resources to dedicate themselves to their work.

4.4 Strengthen Risk Management and Emergency Response Mechanisms

To address increasing uncertainties in cyberspace, universities must establish and refine risk management systems. Proposed strategies include: First, employing a risk identification subsystem using technology and expert analysis for precise assessment. Second, establishing a risk prevention and control subsystem to formulate countermeasures and build resource frameworks. Third, activating an emergency management subsystem during crises to deploy measures and minimize impacts. Fourth, implementing a post-crisis recovery subsystem for relief and restoration. Finally, a learning and optimization subsystem should synthesize lessons to refine future plans. Strengthening organizational command mechanisms ensures rapid response, safeguarding the stable advancement of united front work.

They are not only disseminators of knowledge but also guardians safeguarding ideological security and promoting cultural identity.
